Frequency Coordinator's Report (Jeff Carrier, K0JSC/Mike Gurski, K0GUR):

- Update on activities
  - o 15 repeaters coordinated this year.
  - o 5 coordinations pending.
- VHF pairs in metro areas are used up.
- UHF pairs are being used up but there are some openings
- Coordinated pairs that are not active will have their coordination cancelled and be returned to the pool. Per the rules a system owner has 12 months to have their equipment in operation. The council is trying to be accommodating but will hold to that time period.
- Published repeater system listed in public space does not mean it is coordinated.
   DeWayne mentioned that is an issue. The "uncoordinated" system must resolve any issues.
- The database system used for coordination, created in 2003, is no longer functioning due to the programming environment end of life. Currently there is a manual system being used for coordinating systems. There is an effort in process to replace the old system with an access database. It should be in beta testing soon. Plan is to have it online around December 2017.
- This year's annual updates will be sent out by mail in paper form until the automated system is replaced. Chairperson expressed his desire that the treasurer negotiates any financial agreement to produce the annual updates.
- Those attending, again, expressed their appreciation for the great work the Frequency Coordinators are doing.



#### ARRL Membership in Colorado

As of September 2017, the ARRL Colorado Section has shown a -0.8% total net loss in our overall ARRL Membership over the preceding year ending September 2016. This represents a net total of 3,619 ARRL members out of the 7,289 current members in the entire Rocky Mountain Division (CO, UT, WY, and NM). Last year at this same time there were 3,635 ARRL members in Colorado. Colorado ARRL affiliated hams make up about 50% of the Rocky Mountain Division's total ARRL membership.

I believe that the overall decline in nationwide ARRL members is due to a couple of problems. First of all, we are seeing some attrition due to some of our more senior members going SK and the bulk of our ARRL members are hams that were licensed as far back as the mid-1950's. Secondly, I believe that the increase in ARRL membership dues may have caused some members to not renew or join. That is always the chance when you increase dues of any sort even though your ARRL membership is still a bargain considering the representation and the benefits offered overall.

To this extent, we desperately need to offer an entry-level amateur radio license exam more suited to attract people under the age of 30 to the hobby. The ARRL is considering changing the entry level exam to reflect more of what might be more attractive to potential hams by modernizing the question pool and making more in line to today's technologies.

The ARRL Colorado Section reflects the losses in the Rocky Mountain Division this year with the total number of hams and net gains/losses in ARRL membership/month and yet, is showing less losses than most ARRL Sections in the USA. For reference, the overall losses of the ARRL in the USA and its entities has declined at a -3.8% rate over the same time period.

The Rocky Mountain Division ARRL membership has also declined at a -1.9% rate during the same time period. There are approximately 159,316 ARRL members in the USA as of September 2017. Colorado's total ARRL membership makes up approximately 2.2% of the ARRL's entire membership.

According to the FCC's database, as of October 2017, there is a total of 17,141 ACTIVE ham licensees in Colorado. Of which, 3,304 are Extra Class; 904 are Advanced Class; 3833 are General Class; 8957 are Technician Class and there are still 143 classed as Novices (??). So, doing the math once again, 21.1% of all the hams in Colorado are currently ARRL members. C'mon guys and gals, I'm sure we can do better than that! We need to get the new hams to join one of the many great ARRL affiliated Ham Radio Clubs in Colorado and to join the ARRL as a member and reap the many benefits ARRL membership has to offer. As a note of interest... there were about 16,885 ACTIVE ham licenses in February 2017.

#### **ARRL Club Commission Program:**

#### **Commission Terms**

ARRL Affiliated Clubs receive a commission for every new ARRL membership and renewal they submit to ARRL Headquarters.

- Clubs retain a portion of the dues for each regular membership submitted to ARRL Headquarters:
  - Clubs retain **\$15 for each new membership** OR lapsed membership (of two years or more). A NEW MEMBER is defined as any individual who has never been a member of ARRL or any individual who has not retained a membership for two or more calendar years prior to the application submission.
  - Clubs retain **\$2** for each renewal. A RENEWING MEMBER can renew at any time, even before their current membership term expires.

#### First Deployment of CO AUXCOMM/ARES

As I write this letter of thanks and appreciation I am sitting in my office going over the work that the Auxiliary Emergency Communications Unit (Colorado AuxComm) did to help support the Rally Race that happened in Rangely, Colorado this past weekend of July 22nd. I was amazed of the support they gave us. The AuxComm unit was dispatched at the request of our County Commissioners and me in support of this event.

With Rio Blanco being a rural County, we do not have amateur radio operators or infrastructure to support an amateur radio group that would have been the road guards of

all the intersections where the county road meets another road, and which a person with a radio would be stationed there maintaining the race was secure of civilian traffic. AuxComm was able to fill that void.

Without the AuxComm Unit being here for the event we would not have been able to support it, and that would have compromised the safety and welfare of the public as the race was operating on County roads.

What the AuxComm unit provided was a cache of radios, base station and volunteers to help man the road intersections, and man the safety sweep vehicles that clear the roads prior and after each leg of the race. The radios provided allowed the safety cars to communicate with the ICP that the roads were ready for the race.

This has been a great experience for our Office, allowing us to become familiar with an asset the State has available. The AuxComm leaders and volunteers conducted themselves in a very professional manner, which reflected great upon the State of Colorado and our community. You can be proud of this unit, I would recommend to all my peers if they are in need of communication support AuxComm is the unit to go to! Thank you for your continued support of rural Counties.

#### The Amateur Radio Parity Act: Setting the Record Straight

The Amateur Radio Parity Act of 2017 was introduced in the US Senate on July 12, marking another step forward for this landmark legislation. Senators Roger Wicker (R-MS) and Richard Blumenthal (D-CT) are the Senate sponsors. The measure will, for the first time, guarantee all radio amateurs living in deed-restricted communities governed by a homeowner's association (HOA) or subject to any private land use regulations, the right to erect and maintain effective outdoor antennas at their homes. The Senate bill, S. 1534, is identical to H.R. 555, which passed the US House of Representatives in January.

When FCC enacted its PRB-1 policy in 1985 for municipal land-use regulation of amateur antennas, it refused to apply the "no prohibition, reasonable accommodation, least practicable restriction" requirements of that policy to private land-use regulations. That was a mistake by FCC then, and ARRL has been working toward fixing it ever since. We now have a chance to do that. But placing Federal restrictions on private land-use regulations is not an easy task. Covenants and deed restrictions — or CC&Rs, as they are commonly referred to — have been found enforceable for centuries because they are restrictions placed on the land itself, and bind all subsequent owners of that land. While the FCC does have the

jurisdiction to limit covenants where they conflict with Federal telecommunications policy, that jurisdiction is exercised very seldom. The ARPA is necessary in order to cause FCC to exercise that jurisdiction. The ARPA, in the form passed by the House last session (H.R. 1301) and passed again in January of this year without dissent (H.R. 555), and which is now before the Senate (S.1534) is actually far better than the rather vague provisions of PRB-1, which necessitated a good deal of litigation since 1985. The Parity Act would literally guarantee every single radio amateur who lives in a deed-restricted community the right to erect and maintain an "effective outdoor antenna on property under the exclusive use or control of the licensee," regardless of what the covenants say. That is an exceptional benefit to the many thousands of hams living in deed-restricted communities.
